



The Museum Visit

During their two-hour visit, students will enhance their observation and critical thinking skills by connecting the past to the present during their interactive journey into the history of the Los Angeles region's growth and development. Along the way they will evaluate wants versus needs while bartering for supplies to live on an 1840s rancho; discovering how goods and services grew in the 1870s; and making connections between consumerism and advertising in the 1920s. These changes are reinforced by the students during their performance of a 1920s-style radio play.



Classroom Activities

Before or after your visit, students can learn about the 1840s, 1870s, and 1920s by downloading fun and engaging materials from our website (homesteadmuseum.org). Among the activities that meet a number of common core and state standards are math story problems and vocabulary match-up games.




Program Perks

- **Take a self-guided tour of El Campo Santo Cemetery.** This small burial ground established in the 1850s is one of the oldest in Southern California. Before your visit, download the *Kid's Guide to El Campo Santo* from the museum's website. Students will have a great time learning about cemetery symbolism.
